Main Objectives


- Prevent and eliminate pollution





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


Time: Timeline of events

Dialogue

- MoU sets the framework for dialogue
- Informal dialogue between Secretariats
 - Regular
 - Facilitated by both being in the same City!
- Observership at eachother's meetings
- Formal communications
 - Advising of matters of mutual interest
 - Drawing questions of concern to attention
- Technical dialogue (e.g. in joint tasks)
- National inter-ministerial consultation and dialogue



Joint activity: Describing EBSAs

- On the basis of a CBD COP decision
- NE Atlantic Countries wished to use OSPAR and NEAFC as the platform to bring together expertise to describe a set of areas meeting the CBD criteria
- A tangible task that required some behavioural change from both organisations
- Results: A set of areas meeting the EBSA criteria for the North East Atlantic. Accepted (technically) by NEAFC and OSPAR
- Outcome: the Organisations able to learn to conduct technical work that was stronger for using the capacities of both



Collective arrangement

- Non-legally binding text
- Agreed between international organisations competent for managing human activities
- Cooperate and coordinate
- Concerns areas in ABNJ with area specific management actions
- Guided by internationally agreed principles and norms
- Sets the framework to cooperate and coordinate important not to undermine eachother's work
- Step 1: agreed between OSPAR and NEAFC as of 2014
