- Extended Producer Responsibility
- Sustainable Procurement Policies
- Fiscal and economic instruments
- Deposits, Return and Restoration System
- Agreements with retailers to set Marine Litter reduction objective
- Work with plastic industry to minimize the decomposition characteristics of plastic in order to reduce microplastic
- No-special-fee approach where appropriate
- Fishing for Litter system/Compulsory national programmes on the removal of existing Marine Litter
- Adopt-a-Beach practices



Enhanced Integrated Solid Waste Management Measures

By 2020:

- Close illegal land dumpsites
- Prevent Marine Litter from dredging activities
- Ensure adequate urban sewer and wastewater treatment plants
- Take enforcement measures to combat:
 - littering on the beach
 - illegal sewage disposal in the sea, coastal zone and rivers

By 2025:

 Integrated Solid Waste Managements for agglomerations of 20,000 or more inhabitants
