Reclaim and reaffirm the commitment to the principles of sustainable development: 'common but differentiated responsibility', 'precautionary principle', the principle of 'historical responsibility' (historical debt) and more recently the principle of 'free prior and informed consent'. Re-establish state responsibility as an indispensable actor in the process of delivering basic services to people beginning with setting legal and enforceable frameworks and standards of gender equality and social, economic and ecological justice in order to maintain and create sustainable and holistic communities;
