#### Brief history

- 2005 Environmentally Sustainable Transport Forum for Asia founded, with annual meetings
- 2009 EST-LAC has first meeting
- 2011 SSATP commissions approach paper to recommend actions to mainstream climate change into transport policy – among other things, recommends development of an EST for Africa
- 2012 SSATP shares results during TRB transport meetings in Washington. Begins dialog with UNEP about potential collaboration.
- 2012 at Rio +20, World Bank joins AfDB and other MDBs in voluntary commitment, pledging \$175 billion over 10 years for sustainable transport. Accelerates need for EST-Africa, to enable Africa to take advantage of MDB voluntary commitment.

### Brief history (II)

- 2013 SSATP and UNEP begin discussing the idea with African governments
- 2013 Kenyan Government signals strong interest in championing the idea, and in hosting the first conference of the Forum
- 2014 SSATP / World Bank agrees with UNEP collaborate through a jointly funded secretariat to support Kenyan hosts
- 2014 UN-Habitat contributes some resources to secretariat
- October 2014 1<sup>st</sup> conference of ASTF

#### Basic principles – ASTF should:

- be an African initiative
- have an agenda, priorities, structure, working relationships set by member countries
- develop a vision of "sustainable transport" should reflect African realities, African aspirations, African development processes
- work to mainstream the concepts of sustainable transport and inclusive green growth into transport policies in Africa
- bring together high level decision makers who have a stake in sustainable transport, but do not ordinarily collaborate together at this level (e.g. Transport and Environment ministers)
- seek to positively influence the pipeline of transport infrastructure projects
- not replace existing initiatives, but rather, tie them together in a coherent way to better respond to country needs and aspirations

#### What might the ASTF do?

- Help influence policy and funding priorities in Africa toward sustainable transport
- Help identify a common African vision of sustainable transport for the African context
- Help member countries understand differentiated responsibilities that are required to advance sustainable transport
  - Roles of national and sub-national governments
  - Roles of environment, transport, works, urban development, trade, and finance in advancing sustainable transport
- Help prioritize partners' initiatives and programs and help ensure they cohere and converge toward vision of sustainable transport
- Harmonize & strengthen Africa's voice in international discussions of sustainability and transport

- Understandable tendency to think of sustainable transport as specific outcomes
  - Good mass transport
  - Advanced clean vehicle technology

  - Intermodalism
- Sustainable transport defined more by what goes into decisions on transport?

- 4. Affordability (for individuals and society as a whole)
- 5. Economic value of past investments
- 6. Social cohesion
