### **Support Delivery of the SDGs**



Sharing knowledge on climate science, policies and best practices; facilitating the transfer of climate technologies, including efficient lighting and appliances; integrating climate change into national and sectoral policies; and facilitating readiness for and access to climate finance.



Building resilience to disasters and conflicts by supporting healthier ecosystems and smarter natural resource management, including through post-crisis environmental assessments, post-crisis environmental recovery, environmental cooperation for peacebuilding, and reduced disaster risk.



Working with governments and other stakeholders to ensure that the region's ecosystems are managed sustainably; catalyzing regional and national efforts to protect and manage critical natural capital.



Integrating the environment into the deliberations of regional and sub-regional forums; supporting the implementation of international and regional environmental agreements; supporting UN system-wide strategies on environment at regional and national levels; and integrating environment into national development planning.







Building capacity and supporting policies to promote resource efficiency and sustainable patterns of consumption and production, including in the fields of tourism, rice production, urban development, infrastructure and building design.



### Snapshot: Lighting the way in Viet Nam

Vietnamese farmer Nguyen Minh Cam earns over 70% of his income by cultivating dragon fruit, a regional delicacy that requires long daylight to blossom and bear fruit. After replacing the incandescent bulbs on his farm with compact fluorescent lamps, Minh Cam's electricity bill dropped from \$700 to \$220 per lighting session. His farm is one of 60 dragon fruit plantations that are part of UNEP's project to phase out incandescent lamps in Viet Nam. The initiative is funded by the Global Environment Facility and implemented alongside local partners.

## **Our New Initiatives**

Our funding needs include:

- Supporting financing frameworks for sustainable development in Indonesia, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Thailand and Viet Nam – \$1 million
- Supporting Nepal to ensure environmental resilience following the 2015 earthquake
  \$6 million
- Empowering women's sustainable energy entrepreneurship and access \$5 million
- Implementing a Sustainable Lifestyles and Education Initiative for 41 Asia-Pacific countries – \$4 million
- Implementing a market preparedness and capacity building programme on energy efficient lighting and sustainable buildings -\$5 million
- Combating the illegal wildlife trade through strengthened cooperation between Asia and Africa - \$2 million
- Enhancing the resilience of vulnerable people through innovative ecosystemsbased approaches to disaster risk reduction
  \$4 million
