

Introduction

This Sourcebook has been compiled to provide those concerned with conservation and biological diversity with a guide to expertise and information. It is hoped that it will help build bridges between individuals and organizations; helping all of us to maximize existing sources of expertise and information. The Sourcebook is a kind of "road map" to key organizations, resources, data and services. The sources covered are: organizations, books, periodicals, multi-media CD-ROMs, video films, commercial databases available online or as packaged products (typically in CD-ROM format), and public-access information available over the Internet.

The starting point for this Sourcebook is the expertise and information available in and through three of conservation's leading organizations: IUCN-The World Conservation Union, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF). This "triumvirate" produced the World Conservation Strategy in 1980 and its successor, Caring for the Earth in 1991. Through IUCN's membership and voluntary commissions, UNEP's links to governments and WWF's network of national organizations, they provide a framework for cooperation among scientists, researchers and policy experts in government agencies and non-governmental organizations around the world.

In compiling this Sourcebook, it became evident that it would not be possible to provide a comprehensive listing or database of all organizations and information resources related to biological diversity and conservation. Indeed, this task will most likely fall to the Clearinghouse that will be established under the Convention on Biological Diversity. Nevertheless, it is hoped that this Sourcebook will provide a useful starting point for any institution or organization working in this field.

It should be noted that a growing number of biodiversity management programmes have turned to the Internet and other electronic data programmes to enhance their communications infrastructure. As some Sourcebook users may not be familiar with computerized information resources, basic information on Internet and other electronic sources has been included.

Chapter 1 provides an overview of key international policy and information resources. It focuses on a selection of organizations and/or programmes affiliated with IUCN, UNEP, and/or WWF. In addition, a small number of other organizations have been included because of their importance.

Chapter 2 is a directory of contacts: IUCN Regional and Country Offices, UNEP Regional and Country Offices and WWF Offices and National Organizations. It also lists the offices of National Commissions on Sustainable Development (NCSDs) and the UNEP-Infoterra National Focal Points (NFPs), thereby giving at least one contact for nearly every country in the world. This publication marks the first time that information on IUCN offices and UNEP Infoterra NFPs have been combined under one cover. Offices of the WWF/IUCN sponsored TRAFFIC network are included. Information on the libraries, documentation centres and databases maintained by IUCN members are listed [based on data collected as part of an IUCN survey conducted in 1994].

Chapters 3-6 provide guidance to important literature, information systems, services, electronic networks, and audiovisual materials that have been tried and tested and/or recommended — all with a focus on conservation and biodiversity. As with the organizations listed in Chapters 1-2, these sources are not the only information resources available, but can be used to direct the user to more extensive holdings, when necessary. Also note that some of the resources produced by organizations listed in Chapters 1-2 have not been reproduced in chapters 3-6 in order to save space.

An index is included at the end of the text, and for the electronic version of the Sourcebook each record is tagged to help the user find the information. The "tagging" is based on a system used by the International Institute for

Sustainable Development (IISD) in their <u>Sustainable Development Sourcebook</u>¹. The electronic version will be available through the UNEP INFOTERRA Gopher. Electronic distribution will allow greater dissemination at lower cost and also make easier the task of producing a second edition.

In the text itself, space is provided for updating existing entries. For example, telex and electronic mail addresses for listed organizations are left blank if information was not available, but the space was left free to allow for easier updates by users in their personal copies and by the editors in subsequent editions.

3 Description

CIESIN is a consortium of universities, research institutes and organizations with the goal of improving access to and enhancing the use of global change information for decision-makers. Emphasis includes three topic areas, each with a biodiversity or conservation component: (a) human dimensions of global and regional environmental change, (b) sustainable development, and (c) natural disaster research and reduction. CIESIN provides information services, clearinghouse functions, and support training.

The CIESIN Information Cooperative aids the global distribution of information and provides an access system to socioeconomic, environmental, public health, and policy-relevant data and information. Active partners in the Cooperative include IUCN, UNEP-GRID, WCMC, WHO, the World Bank, the International Geosphere-Biosphere Programme (IGBP), the World Climate Research Programme (WCRP) and other institutions from around the world.

3 Description

CITES establishes the international legal framework for the prevention of trade in endangered species and for an effective regulation of trade in others. It gives producer and consumer countries their share of the joint responsibility, creates the necessary means for the international cooperation which is essential for fulfilling this responsibility, provides for the monitoring of international trade and identifies the species of wild fauna and flora falling in a recognized category of threat. Listed species are given varying levels of protection depending on potential and existing threats to them. The lists, or Appendices to CITES, can be amended every two years by Meeting of the Conference of the Parties or in between meetings when urgent action is required.

The Secretariat undertakes scientific and technical studies and surveys, including policy studies, and prepares official documentation for meetings of the Conferences of the Parties and other bodies established under the Convention. These include publishing methods of identifying species. It periodically publishes the Appendix lists and other reports. Description

The Convention on Biological Diversity was opened for signature in Rio de Janeiro in June 1992 during the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development. The Convention promotes: conservation of biological diversity, sustainable use of the components of biological diversity and fair and equitable sharing of the benefits arising out of the utilization of genetic resources. A secretariat was established under the Convention to discharge functions outlined in the Convention and agreed by the Conference of the Parties.

A Clearing-house mechanism will be established to facilitate the exchange of expertise and information. Areas for

cooperation may include information on: national strategies, plans and programmes, including legislation, for implementing the Convention; expertise and access to technical and scientific data; programmes and projects on conservation of biodiversity and sustainable use; methodologies and technologies for assessing and valuing biological resources and for analyzing requirements for their conservation and sustainable use; benefits to be derived from the use of genetic resources and sharing of benefits from such use; traditional knowledge to conserve biological diversity and sustainably use its components; and socio-economic research.

3 Description

The Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations (FAO) was founded in Quebec City (Canada) in 1945 and is the largest of the United Nations specialized agencies. FAO has 169 member nations, one associate member (Puerto Rico) and one member organization (the European Union). The preamble of the FAO constitution states the organization's goals as "rising levels of nutrition and standards of living of the peoples under their respective jurisdictions; securing improvements in the efficiency and the production of all food and agricultural products; bettering the condition of rural populations; and thus contributing toward an expanding world economy and ensuring humanity's freedom from hunger".

As the leading international body for food and agriculture, FAO has four main functions: to provide technical advice and assistance; to collect, analyze and disseminate information on food, nutrition, agriculture, fisheries and forestry; to offer independent advice to governments, international organizations and non-governmental organizations and provide a forum where groups can meet and discuss food and agricultural issues.

The organization functions as an information centre, collecting, analyzing, interpreting and disseminating information through various media, including print, radio, television, video, film and photo displays, and exhibitions. The anniversary of FAO's founding is celebrated as World Food Day on October 16 every year, when member countries and NGOs around the world participate in special events highlighting one particular priority theme.

Materials produced by FAO include information booklets, technical documents, reference papers and reports of meetings, training manuals and audiovisual materials.

Major periodicals are issued in English, French and Spanish and include Ceres-The FAO Review (bimonthly), The State of Food and Agriculture (annual), FAO Quarterly Bulletin of Statistics, Food and Agricultural Legislation (annual), Unasylva (forestry quarterly), World Animal Review (quarterly), Plant Protection Bulletin (quarterly), and Rural Development (annual), FAO yearbooks are issued on rural development, trade, fertilizers, forest products, field projects, fishery statistics and animal health. FAO and UNEP publish Animal Genetic Resources Information (irregular) which is concerned with the conservation and management of domestic livestock. FAO and the International Plant Genetic Resources Institute publish the Plant Genetic Resources Newsletter (irregular). IPGRI also publishes an annual entitled: Geneflow: a publication about the Earth's plant genetic resources (available from

IPGRI, Via delle Sette Chiese 142, 00145 Rome, Italy).

AGROSTAT PC, an electronic version of FAO's statistical yearbooks, is designed to be used on a simple, personal computer. It provides updated figures on all agriculture-related topics in six files: population, land use, production, trade, food balance sheets and forest products.

Other important statistical information produced by FAO's technical divisions include the Fisheries Statistical Database (FISHDAB), Globefish Data Bank and Electronic Library, Forestry Resources Information System (FORIS), and the Geographic Information System (GIS).

FAO compiles and coordinates an extensive range of international databases on the literature of agriculture, fisheries, forestry, food as well as statistics. The three most important are: AGRIS (the International Information System for the Agricultural Sciences and Technology), ASFA (Aquatic Sciences and Fisheries Abstracts, published with the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission (IOC) and UN) and CARIS (the Current Agricultural Research Information System).

To meet the increasing supply and demand for agricultural data, FAO is preparing the World Agricultural Information Centre (WALICENT), designed to improve access, particularly to extend users, via online mechanisms, floppy disks and CD. More information on these products is found in Chapter 4.

The Global Biodiversity Strategy Programme, organized by the IUCN, UNEP and World Resources Institute, is designed to mobilize worldwide action to sustain the living resources of the planet. In cooperation with partner organizations from around the world, the programme strives to develop strategies, stimulate action, provide information and technical advice, improve policies and methods for conserving biodiversity, and promote biodiversity as a major development issue. Launched in 1992 after two years of consultations, expert workshops, and review, the Global Biodiversity Strategy provides the framework for action.

Organizations associate themselves with the programme by undertaking cooperative research; organizing, hosting, or participating in workshops; contributing ideas and materials for case-studies; and promoting the Strategy and Action Plan and the implementation of specific projects and reforms. The programme is also working on case studies on bio-regional management.

The Global Environment Facility (GEF) is an independent financial mechanism that provides grant and concessional funding to developing countries for projects and activities that aim to protect the global environment. GEF resources are available for projects and other activities that address climate change, biological diversity, international waters and depletion of the ozone layer. GEF resources are also available for land degradation (desertification and deforestation) as it relates to the other four focal areas.

For funding in climate change or biodiversity, countries must have signed the climate change or biodiversity treaties. Countries can obtain GEF funds if they are eligible to borrow from the World Bank or if they are eligible to receive technical assistance grants from UNDP.

GEF is implemented by the World Bank, UNDP and UNEP. The GEF secretariat is independent from the implementing agencies, but supported administratively by the World Bank. The GEF Council governs operational policies and programmes.

GRID also aims to improve, harmonize and support the use of GIS and associated data management technologies. GRID endeavors to develop user-friendly, free and open access to environmental information through a global system that works "as simply as a telephone network".

GRID offers training to personnel from developed and developing countries in the use of GIS for environmental

management and as tools for capacity-building for sustainable development. It also provides for distribution of data and data referral.

3 Description

The Stockholm Conference on the Human Environment, convened by the United Nations in 1972 to consider the condition of the environment, called for an international mechanism for the exchange of environmental information. The INFOTERRA was to develop a mechanism to "facilitate the exchange of environmental information within and among nations". Since its early years INFOTERRA has evolved and expanded its services to include substantive information and document delivery.

INFOTERRA began its operations in 1977 with a dozen partner countries. It was designed as a decentralized information system operating through a worldwide network of national environmental institutions designated and supported by their governments as National Focal Points and coordinated by a programme activity centre at UNEP Headquarters in Nairobi. The INFOTERRA National Focal Points are usually situated in the information and

documentation sections of environment ministries, and national environmental protection agencies which are often also the focal points for national information networks.

INFOTERRA currently consists of 170 National Focal Points, 11 Regional Service Centres, and 34 Special Sectoral Sources (see section below). Regional service centres have been set up, within key National Focal Points, to act as centres for regional co-operation. The regional service centres act as focal points for the exchange of information and experience at regional level and for the development of sub-networks to facilitate this exchange.

INFOTERRA network partners use four working languages to communicate: English, French, Russian and Spanish. Substantive information can usually be located or, if necessary, translated into most of the world languages.

4 Key Information Resources

The <u>International Directory of Sources</u> is a "Who's Who" of environmental expertise compiled by national focal points. It exists as both printed 'hardcopy' and as a Micro CDS/ISIS database. It does not contain all the world's environmental information in itself, but is the means of access to more than 7,000 sources of information on over 1,000 environmental subjects. The sources are located in government ministries and documentation centres, research institutes, universities, non-governmental and international organizations, United Nations agencies and private consultancies. The sources can be accessed by country, by name of organization and by environmental subject-area.

3 Descriptions

As environmental problems increase in complexity and specialized scientific knowledge proliferates, there is an ever increasing need by network users for substantive information specific to particular needs in highly technical areas of concern. Certain organizations stand out as international centres of excellence in particular fields. INFOTERRA has identified thirty-four such centres of excellence and made them Special Sectoral Sources (SSSs). These centres have been selected because of their ability to provide highly specialized scientific responses to users' queries. Many of the SSSs are within the UN system, but others are national or international institutions, nongovernmental organizations and private institutions. INFOTERRA has contracted with these SSSs to provide detailed tailored responses to INFOTERRA queries. Some SSSs charge fees for their services and it is best to inquire about fees before ordering information. UNEP INFOTERRA subsidizes the cost of some requests from developing country Governments. 3 Description

UNESCO manages the Man and the Biosphere Programme and hosts the Convention Concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage, commonly called the World Heritage Convention. The Programme and the international treaty both are designed to protect natural areas as well as landscapes that have been sculpted by the interaction of humans and environment. The IUCN assists UNESCO in evaluating sites which are nominated to become World Heritage Sites under the Convention. On environmental issues UNESCO also cooperates with other organizations, such as FAO, UNEP, the International Council of Scientific Unions (ICSU), the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission (IOC), and the International Union of Biological Sciences (IUBS).

The MAB Programme was launched in 1971 to seek answers as to how humanity affects the biosphere and what could be done to avoid further degradation. The 300 plus biosphere reserves in over 75 countries each consist of a minimally disturbed core area surrounded by buffer zones and transitional areas to areas of greater human impact. As part of the research programme, UNESCO publishes the MAB Digest Series, which provides overview of recent, ongoing and planned activities relating to policy, scientific, and other aspects of biosphere reserves.

World Bank activities to protect and enhance the environment are based on a fourfold agenda: assisting countries in setting priorities, strengthening institutions and implementing programmes for sustainable development; minimizing the potential adverse environmental and social impacts of development projects; building on the positive linkages between poverty reduction, economic efficiency, and environmental protection; and addressing global environmental challenges.

In accomplishing their missions, the Regional Development Banks deal with similar environmental and social issues.

Chapter 2. Libraries, Information Services and Databases Regional and Country Sources

2.0 Introduction, by Eric Howard

Records are arranged regionally, and then alphabetically by name of country. National sources that serve a region are located under the nation, but are referred to at the start of the regional section. In several instances, the same organization may be an IUCN member and an Infoterra office, the National Commission on Sustainable Development (NCSD) Coordinator, or a WWF National Organization. Since the contact person is often different, they are listed separately.

All UNEP Infoterra Focal Points have access to the Infoterra Database of national information sources. An electronic search of this database in June 1994 found over 1,600 institutional sources working on biodiversity and conservation topics, ranging from aquatic animals to zoological gardens. (This search was based on 47 keywords from the UNEP-Infoterra Thesaurus). It was not possible to include all of these contacts and organizations in this Sourcebook. Instead, we have provided the contact information for all of the Infoterra national nodes as well as the Infoterra special sectoral sources. The Pacific SDN will concentrate on modifying the responses to these pressures at the community level because: 1) communities control the great majority of natural resources in the region; 2) the pressure these communities exert on the natural resource base are related to meeting basic needs and generating modest amounts of income; and 3) regional and national organizations that are concerned with sustainable development need to better link their efforts to the community level.

Pacific SDN will address needs at the community level in terms of sustainable development through a greater coordination of organizations and resources already dedicated to sustainable development. The national governments and regional institutions with the support of donor organizations are the main provider of services and information

in the region. Their sustainable development programme coordination and programme focus on the community level will be facilitated through enhanced sustainable development information exchange within the region and increased access to international data and information services. Access of local communities to this nexus of information and services will be enhanced by the services provided through designated in-country organizations. The goal of these efforts is to effect change at the community level in order to halt the increasing degradation of the natural environment while setting communities on the path of sustainable natural resource management.

Chapter 3. Books and Periodicals

3.0 Environmental Information: A Bookseller's Perspective, by Bernard Mercer, Managing Director, Natural History Book Service

The professionalization of environmental research over the last two decades has had a dramatic impact on the volume, scope and diversity of environmental information. During most of this century, data in the sciences and social sciences was collected by universities, expeditions and fieldwork sponsored by learned societies, and through the efforts of amateur groups and individuals. Information was shared by these communities via books, journals and papers. In the immediate post-war period, the range of organisations involved in research began to widen: governments and intergovernmental bodies (particularly in North America, Europe and Australasia) significantly increased their sponsorship of research by setting up specialised agencies and through funding of local, national and international projects. And from the late 1960's, nongovernmental groups also started to generate information either by contracting with outside professionals or by creating their own in-house research facilities. These developments were accompanied by rapid growth in the higher education sector, with new universities, colleges and institutes proliferating around the world.

The rapid growth of research centres has inevitably led to a sharp acceleration in data output. There seems no likelihood that this will slow down, given the huge amount of work which remains to be done at the species, ecosystem and global level.

At the same time as output rose, the nature of environmental information and the objectives of those involved in producing it became much more complex. The increasingly interdisciplinary character of research is a function of the growing awareness of the interdependence of biological and physical systems. Furthermore, a serious ecosystem study would have to pay attention to human interactions as well as biophysical data. Subjects like ethnobotany, palaeobiogeography, agroforestry and ecotourism hardly existed twenty years ago, but are now important disciplines.

But perhaps the most significant development of all is the revolution which has taken place in the production and dissemination of environmental information. Desktop publishing, CD-ROMs, video/multimedia and the Internet now all exist as communication tools. Whereas in the past authors could only successfully contact their audience by publishing work through one of the few major international book and journal publishers or under the aegis of a learned society, it is now possible to reach a peer group direct, at relatively low cost.

These changes have made environmental information much more freely available and have enabled researchers to propel issues like climate change, conservation biology and ecological economics into the public eye. It can be argued that the standards of debate over environmental issues have been raised as a result.

Accessibility of environmental information presents producers, intermediaries and users with new opportunities but also raises new problems. For example, an ongoing paper reporting survey work on elephant populations in Southern Africa could be published directly onto the Internet. Other workers in this field would benefit from the immediacy and freshness of the data. But they could also be seriously disadvantaged if the data contained errors as a result of not having been subject to the scrutiny of peer group review. Issues relating to the distribution of Internet data also need to be addressed. If the ongoing paper was widely and intelligently advertised on all the appropriate bulletin boards, then most interested parties might be reached, thus rendering an intermediary unnecessary. However, if the paper were not advertised properly, an intermediary (bookseller, journals subscription agent, information broker) would

have a role to play. This would be even more true if the paper contained observations of relevance to other groups of environmentalists (for example, ecosystem/land-use researchers) in addition to those with a primary interest in elephants.

Where information producers need to avail themselves of the peer review system or produce interdisciplinary material of value to a diverse audience, then publishers and booksellers (whether in the commercial sector or not) will continue to prove valuable intermediaries. However the information flows develop, it seems improbable that the need to evaluate the worth of information - so critical in determining approaches to future research - will disappear. Perhaps a plethora of Internet review journals will spring up to fulfill this function.

The NHBS Title Database and the Title Selection

The following selection of books, journals and multimedia titles constitute a core list drawn from the NHBS title database and reflect everything that has been discussed above. All titles were selected because of their value to practising conservationists and researchers, and were chosen from a total of over 40,000 titles, drawn from a total of more than 5,000 publishers, in 30 languages. All titles were in-print at the time this Sourcebook went to press; in that respect this list is fundamentally different from most bibliographies. It is felt that many users of this Sourcebook will not necessarily have ready access to a well-stocked library, and a bibliography of current materials will therefore be more useful. Unlike most annotated bibliographies we can verify the accuracy of the majority of this material, having had most of it pass through our hands.

However, although the list reflects our core selection we cannot claim completeness. A truly global environment bibliography would include a great deal more literature in languages other than English. Current environmental information in Cyrillic and Chinese account for a large proportion of world data. Other weaknesses include under-representation of the growing body of material on Latin America which is published in Spanish and Portuguse. We hope to remedy some of these defects in future revisions of the Sourcebook.

How to Use the Bibliography

The section is split into four sections: reference, books, journals, and multimedia. The reference section contains books of interest to all readers of this part of the Sourcebook, listing what could be considered essential general titles for conservationists, whatever their particular specialisation. The books section is by far the biggest component, containing nearly 600 titles chosen for their usefulness in relation to conservation activity. The majority are practical books with a specific focus, but there are also a number of key scientific texts which provide necessary background. They are broken down into various subject headings, some purely scientific, some thematic. The reader will usually need to examine more than one section to gain the material required. For example, those interested in forest preservation will find relevant titles in botany, natural resources, ecosystems, and habitat and species conservation.

The list of journals is somewhat shorter. Here we have selected general journals which either cover a broad field, or a substantial geographic area. We have avoided listing too many species specific titles to save the section from unwieldiness. Finally, our multimedia section demonstrates that interest is increasing in the environmental arena for this useful medium. Although emphasis lies with general refence tools, there are a few titles with direct relevance to conservation.

Chapter 4. Commercial Online and CD-ROM Resources

4.0 Computerized Databases, by Mary Cordiner, World Conservation Monitoring Centre

The growth of online and CD-ROM databases started in the early 1970s. Hence the reason that most of the databases listed below cover material from about that time or later. Although growth then was based on well-known scientific abstracts journals, on-line databases did not include abstracts. Instead records were carefully indexed according to thesauri and classification systems to aid retrieval. Abstracts became commonly available in the early 1980s. CD-ROMs have become more popular since the mid 1980s. Many CD-ROM products are also available in online or printed format: it is used to distribute abstracts journals, learned scientific journals and books, particularly encyclopedias.

4.01 Online Databases

The commercial online industry grew steadily through the 1970s and 1980s with substantial increases in the number of hosts (companies whose compters held a large number of databases for searching) and type of databases eg business databases. Now the industry is going through a period of change with the merger of several key players.

On-line searching is often regarded as expensive but it is worth cosidering the time it would take to carry out the same literature search using the printed version of the database. The total cost of a search comprises three elements, the time connected to the database, the cost of displaying or printing relevant bibliographic references and the royalties for use, without considering the telecommunications costs. The move currently is to charge only for information retrieved.

Typical costs on the Dialog databases, one of the larger online information providers, range between US \$30 and US \$60 per connect hour (CAB Abstracts and BIOSIS Previews respectively). So for every hour or fraction thereof connected to the database the user is charged according to the hourly rate, regardless of whether the user is searching or viewing records. When the user views all information available on record an additional charge of US \$ 1.30 is made per record viewed. A simple search in BIOSIS Previews, for references to conservation and resource management, using the BIOSIS coding system, in Mozambique retrieved 21 records of which 19 were relevant cost approximately US \$35.

Although most of the databases described in the first section are described as 'commercial' this refers only to the access route. Many databases have been developed by not-for-profit organisations (eg. CAB Abstracts by CAB International - formerly Commonwealth Agricultural Bureaux) which have or had substantial government backing. In the early days equipment to permit access was very expensive and the need for good user support databases were made available to a large audience through 'commercial' hosts. Some commercial hosts have 'advertising' pages on the Internet and access via that route is likely to become a reality in the very near future. Indeed it has already been achieved by ECHO.

Most, if not all, commercial hosts will provide generic information about types of compatible equipment and contact addresses for telecommunications. To access commercial online databases some equipment is essential, namely

a computer terminal (with an electronic communications package will be needed and a terminal emulation package may be required)

a modem (with a personal computer, this may be simply an additional piece of hardware)

an account with the national PTT (Telecommunications organisation - essential if the national packet switching network is to be used)

an account with the host organisation who will provide a password.

Online searching gives access to a far wider swathe of literature than all but the largest libraries can afford to collect. Most databases concentrate on standard literature e.g. books, conference proceedings, journal articles and specifically exclude grey literature e.g. reports from small organisations, unpublished reports and more ephemeral material which is often difficult to obtain. Even so one can identify published literature which is not readily available locally and to counter this many hosts offer a document supply service for a charge.

No single online database covers all aspects of biodiversity and there is a degree of overlap between the coverage of the main databases which include material on biodiversity. New areas are emerging such as biodiversity economics which do not always sit comfortably in the coverage of most scientific databases and as yet are not adequately covered. Therefore, training in searching techniques is highly desirable.

4.02 CD-ROMs

CD-ROM has emerged as one of the major forms of information and data distribution over the last 7 years. This trend will continue and intensify. CD-ROMs are used in a wide variety of organisations e.g. research institutions, universities, schools. Thus the level and presentation of material varies according to the target market. In addition to the capacity to handle large quantities of text, it offers the capability to distribute images, graphics and audio information.

As increasing numbers of end-users search databases this format offers an excellent and in many cases preferable alternative to online. The end-user can browse and search the database while familiarising him/herself with search techniques and the database content without the pressure of rapidly mounting costs as happens in the online situation. So in some circumstances it is replacing online usage. While online databases have frequent updating schedules only some CD-ROMs are updated at regular intervals: others are updated irregularly or have no update schedule.

CD-ROMs are acquired for a one-off charge. This may give the user outright purchase or may be a type of lease agreement. As such they offer more budgetary control and no additional costs are incurred for frequent use: in frequent use the initial high outlay may easily be recouped. Favourable charge rates may be offered for developing countries. Schemes exist whereby organisations in developing countries may receive financial assistance to acquire the hardware and the purchase costs of the databases under overseas aid programmes.

Suppliers of CD-ROMS often also supply the hardware necessary to use the medium. In general, IBM compatible 486 processor with a minimum of 4 MB memory and software are necessary, in addition to a CD-ROM drive conforming to ISO 9660 with 680 MB. The commonest platforms are DOS or Windows. Those contemplating acquiring CD-ROMS are advised to consider carefully hardware and software requirements and compatibility.

While CD-ROMs provide a wide variety of information and data some publications are now appearing with complementary diskettes which include additional data e.g. World Resources, or diskettes which combine several publications e.g. HEMDisk for effectively a nominal charge. Not only do these diskettes include the raw data but they also provide facilities for statistical manipulation. This publication will also be distributed on diskette.

The online and CD-ROM listings are necessarily a snapshot of what is available as new products are rapidly coming to the market. It does not attempt to include proposed products e.g. World Heritage are proposing a CD-ROM product giving information about the sites. This product was expected to be available in mid-1994 but is now anticipated for mid-1995.

In some cases the term 'database' has been taken to encompass a large holding of paper-based material, while in others it is difficult to ascertain the precise status of the database being described e.g. proposed, under development or live and fully functional.

In the last case the databases developed may have been distributed in other forms e.g. Fishbase (see CD-ROM section). Most initiatives are at the national level and often refer to a specific aspect of biodiversity e.g. National Wildlife Database (India) (WII, 1993), various Indonesian databases (National Biodiversity Database Workshop, 1991). At the international level the proposed World Bird Database has reached the stage of development work. On the other hand, some take constituents of other databases add data from new sources but effectively cross-cutting existing data holdings in a different manner e.g. Arthropod Index.

Chapter 5. Electronic Networks and Conferences: Internet and Others

5.1 Introduction, by Kevin Grose

"Electronic communication", "e-mail", "Internet", "APC", "ftp" are all terms which appear more and more. Magazine and newspaper articles speak of "information highways", the "Web", and "interconnectivity" while business cards are beginning to feature e-mail addresses. The information below provides a brief introduction to electronic communication, offers some definitions of the concepts and terminology and describes how it can be used.

This section is followed by a description of information resources available on the electronic networks.

What are electronic networks?

Electronic networks are, in fact, chains of interconnected computers. The first networks were created in the 1970s in the United States where governmental and research institutions wanted to maximize the use of powerful computers located at different sites around the country. By using telecommunication lines to link these machines, it became possible for a scientist in California to access a computer in New York. Nowadays, it is possible for the general public to take advantage of this form of communication. Just as you dial a telephone number to call someone, you can "dial" another computer in the same city or on the other side of the world.

Where the telephone system creates a voice connection, the electronic network bundles into "packets" the data from your computer. These packets are "stamped" with the "address" and are dropped into an electronic mailbox. Once in the mailbox, streams of packets are sent over any number of paths to reach the right computer. This process is called "packet switching".

To keep all of this information flowing in the right direction, there are certain rules which must be followed. They are called "protocols". These protocols are standards which govern the software and hardware and ensure that different machines can communicate with each other. A common telecommunications protocol is TCP/IP (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol). Indeed the Internet is the international network which results from the interconnection of these networks using the TCP/IP protocols. More than 20 million computers are now connected to this network of networks.

There are three basic Internet services: Telnet, E-mail and FTP.

Telnet allows you to connect to and use a remote computer. Using Telnet you can "log on" to a remote host computer as though it were in the next room. To help locate information, databases and other services, you can "telnet" to a "gopher". A gopher is a menu system that makes available the resources of the Internet on your computer screen. Also available is "Veronica" which allows you to search menu options across all gopher space.

Telnet has been expanded by the World Wide Web (WWW). Hypermedia is the foundation of WWW (media refers to any type of data such as text, audio, or graphic). Hypermedia connects the media or computer data so that any document is linked to another. You can move between hypermedia documents and explore related documents at your own pace, navigating in whatever direction you choose. For example, IUCN's Library and the IUCN Environmental Law Centre are cooperating with CIESIN - The Consortium for International Earth Science Information Network - to develop a WWW guide to IUCN's information (the Internet address is http://www.ciesin.org or you can request further information from: ciesin.info@ciesin.org).

E-mail (electronic mail) allows you to send electronic messages from one computer to another. By entering the e-mail address, you can type a message and send it via the network. The message will be deposited into the addressee's electronic mail box where it can be read, stored, copied or forwarded. The address is often some component of the recipients name followed by the @ symbol and additional abbreviations indicating the affiliation

of the recipient, be it an organization, business, government agency, or private subscription service. For example, the general IUCN address is: mail@hq.iucn.ch.

E-mails sent to Mailinglists are automatically re-sent to anyone having an address on the list. Those receiving a message from the list can then reply to it and a copy will be sent to all others on the mailing list. These lists are sometimes called mail reflectors or discussion groups. Mailing lists may also be moderated by a list administrator who weeds out duplicates or inappropriate messages. A more sophisticated version of a mailing list is a *Listserv* which has an automated subscription feature and offers other services much like a bulletin board. For example, the World Conservation Monitoring Centre (WCMC) maintains a "Listserv" dealing with trade in endangered species and CITES-related issues ("cites-l@wcmc.org.uk", for more information contact WCMC at: info@wcmc.org.uk.).

FTP (File Transfer Protocol) is a method of downloading (transferring) files over the Internet. Thousands of files containing text, graphical and sound information as well as data sets are available free at FTP sites. Using search tools such as "Archie" you can identify the files that are of interest and then "ftp" them to your computer. This method of document delivery not only saves time but has the added advantage that the information is in digital form and can be used on any personal computer (PC). Some FTP sites have a feature called "mailftp" by which you can send an e-mail to an FTP site, obtain a list of documents stored and select the documents you wish to be sent to you.

While Internet is fast becoming the de facto standard, there are other important networks. One is the APC Network (Association for Progressive Communications), an international non-profit organization dedicated to facilitating progressive social change through cooperative local and global computer networking. Unlike Internet which is mostly a "northern" phenomenon, the APC network represents a partnership of NGOs from north and south. Like Internet, APC networks have e-mail and file transfer facilities and maintain hundreds of electronic conferences. These conferences (such as "IUCN.news" on GreenNet - for information contact support@gn.apc.org) are Bulletin Board Systems where you can access a conference, check on newly posted items, send a reply or download the text of a posted item to your PC. The APC network provides a gateway, or bridge that translates data between the APC network and the Internet.

Why are networks useful?

Using e-mail, you can communicate quickly with people all over the world. If you require expert advice to solve a problem or want to be kept informed, e-mail can help.

E-mail combined with other information tools, services, and resources will help people to communicate better and, perhaps more importantly, offer more people than ever before the opportunity to contribute to world debate by exchanging their ideas and views.

And the cost? Surprisingly low, indeed, some IUCN offices have found that it is cheaper for them to communicate using e-mail than telephone or fax. Remember, though, that e-mail does have its disadvantages. It is digital information and subject to corruption or alteration. It does not bear a signature and will probably not be considered legal. Confidentiality can, likewise, not be guaranteed.

How can you connect to electronic networks?

The simplest access requires only a PC loaded with telecommunications software such as "Kermit" or "CrossTalk", a modem (a device which links computers over a telephone line) and a telephone line. You can than dial the nearest network node, a communications centre via which messages pass. The cost of accessing the networks is normally the cost of a local call to the node plus the cost of an account or subscription with the node. Nearly 140 countries have international network connectivity. To find out how you can connect, ask someone in a university computer science department near you, or contact an NGO with links abroad or the local Post and Telecommunications Office.

Once you have identified the local node administrator, they will help you connect.

If you cannot find a local contact, you can write to one of the members of the Association for Progressive Communications (APC). Members organizations are in Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Ecuador, Germany, Nicaragua, Russia, South Africa, Sweden, United Kingdom, United States, and Uruguay. Since they all cooperate to provide international services, general information can be obtained from any members, such as

The "listserv" format is accessible to anyone with e-mail. Mailinglists usually have two main functions:

- 1) to handle automated mailing for a discussion group/list about a subject, where anyone who has joined the group can mail a message to the mail-managing program (e.g. the listsery computer program) and it gets broadcast to all participants, and
- 2) to serve as a file archive which can distribute files based on request commands contained in e-mail. An example of a new ListServ announcement and information on how to subscribe is given below:

5.4 Internet Resources: Gophers by Sean Gordon and updated by David Dunkley

Version 1: 3 May 1994. Update: 2 December 1994

This report provides a guide to information related to biodiversity at selected Internet gopher sites. The sites are presented in the style of an annotated bibliography which includes tables of contents. The guide initially was part of an ongoing effort at the Environment and Natural Resources Information Center (ENRIC) to provide a "road

map" for information relating to international development and the environment. ENRIC is a programme of the US Agency for International Development (AID).

A wide variety of international biological diversity information was found, including international treaties, project and strategic plans, newsletters, bibliographies, directories of experts, taxonomic lists and even images. Some of the more prominent non-governmental organizations are slowly making increasing amounts of information available over gophers, WWW, and other Internet programs.

There are many ways to access resources on the net, but a survey of gopher sites was chosen because gopher presents the best combination of ease of use, speed in locating resources, and widespread implementation. The gopher program made navigation of the net and downloading of information quite easy. Finding the locations of specific pieces or types of information still requires some research; nevertheless, it is a giant step forward in desktop access to what is literally a world of information. People who only have access to Internet e-mail will not be able to run the gopher program. Members of the APC and other networks usually can access gophers.

By accessing a gopher program, Internet users can navigate through the information stored there by way of menus. Choosing a numbered menu item can not only take the user to information stored on the host computer, but also to information stored on any other gopher site on the net. In fact, many of the biodiversity listings on the internet are simply pointers to the same few sites which actually contained the information.

The menus at the gopher sites are reproduced below. These are actual menus as they appear on the screen when you link to a gopher site. The following symbols tell you about navigation and content of the menus:

--> indicates a menu item was selected and the submenu (with that title) will follow; no arrow means no items from the menu were chosen and anything that follows came from a selection from an earlier menu.

The end of each menu line indicates what type of information it leads to:

/ indicates it leads to another menu <?> indicates it leads to a database search no symbol indicates it leads to a document, which is displayed on-screen and can be downloaded.

In the gopher system only one menu appears on the screen at a time. To save space in this document, multiple menus may have been condensed. The first menu presented here is usually the first seen when entering a site (called the "root"). The arrows (-->) then indicate which items on the menu were selected. The subsequent menu then begins with the title of the item selected in the previous menu. In the first record listed below, only one item "4. Biodiversity" was chosen as relevant to this sourcebook, so there is only one follow-up menu titled "Biodiversity." There is, of course, additional information under the other 16 menu items, but that text is not reproduced in the sourcebook.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION:

The Tropical Data Base (Base de Dados Tropical - BDT) is a major hub of biodiversity networking activities. It is maintained by the Fundação Tropical de Pesquisas e Tecnologia "André Tosello", a Brazilian not-for-profit, private foundation. In addition to containing a number of directories for Brazilian experts and organizations, it is also home to two major international efforts: the Biodiversity Information Network and Bioline Publications. The Biodiversity Information Network (BIN21) evolved out of the 1992 Workshop on the Needs and Specifications for a Biodiversity Information Network, held in Campinas, Brazil and sponsored by the International Union of Biological Sciences, the International Union of Microbiological Societies and the World Federation for Culture Collections. Funding came from a number of Brazilian organizations, UNEP and the British Council. A follow-up

conference was held in early 1994, and documents for this still appear to be flowing into the site. They also maintain an e-mail message broadcast system (a listserver) for biodiversity called BIODIV-L.

Bioline Publications is an electronic publishing service for bioscientists which provides abstracts and summaries of papers in journals, contents lists and summaries of reports and newsletters free of charge, with full-text and graphics available for a fee. Although the list of publications included is still relatively small, it is certainly international and provides more information for free on the publications than I have seen anywhere else. Most of the titles in Bioline focus on microbiology, but there are a few which focus on larger scale biodiversity issues, including: Biopolicy International (African Centre for Technology Studies), Tropical Biodiversity (Indonesian Foundation for Adv. Biol. Sci.), and the Biodiversity Coalition newsletter. A search of all publications for the keyword "biodiversity" produced an extensive list (see below), however many items on the list did not seem to contain a reference to biodiversity.

5.5 Internet Resources - World Wide Web, by Eric Howard, with David Dunkley

As mentioned in the introduction to electronic networks, the World Wide Web (WWW or W³ or The Web) is not another network but rather a navigational tool. WWW is a client/server system that utilizes a standard protocols to locate, retrieve, download or display information in a variety of formats. WWW is, like the Windows computer environment, intuitive and user-friendly.

The WWW uses three electronic document protocols:

HyperText Transfer Protocol (HTTP) which allows the transfer of "Hypertext information" over the Internet. Hypertext allows one document to linked with another, so, for example, a description of a particular species held on one computer can be linked (almost) instantaneously with a map showing its habitat held on another computer thousands of miles away. All that is required to do this is a "click" of the mouse on a highlighted word or image.

Uniform Resource Locator (URL) acts as a kind of addressing system that makes the links possible. A URL looks like: http://www.unep.ch

HyperText markup Language (HTML) which is a document tagging language that allows documents to be well laid out and presented and, at the same time, linked to other documents.

But ease of use has its price, WWW to be used effectively requires a powerful personal computer equipped with Windows and wide bandwidth connexion (28-64 kilobits per second) to the Internet. Nevertheless, it appears that this is the direction in which the electronic networks and it will be important to watch developments and plan accordingly. Given that new WWW "home pages" appear almost everyday, the list below is by no means comprehensive but it does offer a starting point for your exploration of "cyberspace".

An independent, non-profit organisation, TVE's mission is to act as a catalyst for the production of films on environment, development, health and human rights issues; to ensure that films made in the industrialised world-often about problems in the developing world-are broadcast in developing countries; and to encourage film-makers in the South to make their own films on environmental problems, adapted to their own cultural needs. TVE's goal is to raise environmental awareness worldwide: to create a greater understanding of the complex links between resource depletion, social inequity, poverty, health and environmental degradation.

The power of television to communicate environmental messages, often to mass audiences, is well documented. TVE works by acting as a bridge - or broker - between non-broadcast agencies (United Nations agencies, bilateral agencies and organisations such as Oxfam, Panos or WWF) and the television industry. Its skill is to take the seemingly complex priorities of the cooperating agencies and turn them into television programmes that will attract audiences worldwide: to take issues like child development, primary health, poverty or the threat from desertification, and translate them into mainstream television programmes - drama, 'soaps' and children's programmes, as well as documentaries - that focus on the human stories involved in sustainable human development.

In 10 years, TVE has helped catalyse the production of over 200 environmental films and videos, winning at one time or another all the major broadcast prizes.

While TVE co-produces programmes with television stations, broadcasters and independent film-makers from around the world, it has a special remit towards film-makers from the South. The rapid spread of new satellite and cable channels has reinforced the dominance of western programming over the global airwaves - starving southern TV viewers of programmes which effectively represent the realities of their situation. So increasingly, during the past 10 years, TVE has assisted southern producers and directors in making films that mirror their own perspective on their own environmental and development issues. With the BBC and the One World Group of Broadcasters, TVE pioneered the concept of **Developing Stories**. Over two series it has given ten outstanding film-makers from the South an opportunity to make their own programmes, in their own chosen genres, presenting their view on environment and development issues.

6.1 TVE's Distribution and Information Services

TVE's commitment to programme-making can only bear fruit if these films are seen as widely as possible across the world. This was the rationale behind the setting up in 1987 of TVE's Moving Pictures service. Launched with funding from UNEP, the European Commission and the Swiss Development agency, it is the only editorially-independent service of its kind. It provides both a clearinghouse for information about environmental films, with a free or 'at cost' distribution service for developing countries. This offers a wide range of quality programmes on environment, development, health and human rights issues for broadcast and non-broadcast use. In the world's low and middle income countries, where television stations rarely have the contacts or hard currency to acquire quality programmes, this service ensures that these programmes get seen.

Moving Pictures is made up of four components: the distribution service, the quarterly magazine Moving Pictures Bulletin, a database of environmental films and distributors and the OUTREACH service.

TVE Distribution Service

TVE publishes a yearly distribution catalogue listing all the programmes it can make available to television stations and NGOs in the developing world and countries with economies in transition (the former Eastern Bloc countries). The most recent catalogue, *Moving Pictures 5*, was published in November 1993 and contains details of over 200 programmes, categorised thematically, as well as by genre and geographical location. A selection of these films is given below.

To obtain the film, southern broadcasters and NGOs worldwide select the programmes they want from *Moving Pictures 5* and complete an order form to TVE's Distribution Centre, specifying the formats and languages they require. There are varying degrees of charges: up to 10 programmes per order are despatched free-of-charge to television stations in the UN category of low income countries, while middle income countries pay the costs of duplication and despatch. NGOs in low and middle income countries pay similarly staged charges, while NGOs in OECD countries pay a commercial charge that helps to subsidise the free distribution to poorer countries. The service is currently supported by grants from the Netherlands Foreign Ministry and the Swedish International Development Authority (SIDA).

Wherever possible, TVE tries to provide programmes in the main UN languages. When TVE is unable to provide programmes in a language, it sends out an international master, with an English or French script, to enable broadcasters to dub on their own language.

Up to one third of the films in *Moving Pictures 5* are from programme-makers in the South or North/South co-productions. **Moving Pictures** is the only distribution service promoting South-South audio-visual exchange. In the seven years since it first started, this service has distributed over 24,000 tapes to television stations, educational institutions and NGOs in developing countries and countries with economies in transition.

The Moving Pictures Bulletin

A critical review of new environmental films and videos, the *Moving Pictures Bulletin* provides a unique information service to subscribers in both the developed and the developing world. Published quarterly in English, with French and Italian versions from partner organisations, the Bulletin has a global remit: to increase the flow of information between North and South, East and West, on the latest productions dealing with environment, development, health and human rights issues, who distributes them, who is making them - and the context in which they work.

By concentrating on film and audio visual productions on environment and development issues, the Bulletin has developed a unique constituency among broadcasters, educationalists, film-makers, festival organisers, and environment and development NGOs. It has grown from a simple listings service to a specialist magazine, catering for a variety of needs, and from an initial print run of 2000 to 10,000 copies, distributed in 120 countries.

Each issue of the Bulletin is built around a specific theme, with analysis of the issues by specialist writers. Many Bulletins are supported by individual donors who fund supplements focusing on issues of special interest to them. The UK Department of the Environment, for example, funded a special distribution supplement on programmes available to illustrate the agenda of the 1992 UN Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro. Similarly, the European Commission supported the special issue on the Small Island Developing States conference.

The Moving Pictures Database

The database provides a complementary service to back up the Moving Pictures Bulletin. All the films reviewed in the Bulletin are also stored in the database, together with a great many more titles gathered from film festivals, seminars, distributors and through exchanges with other databank operators. Intended to act as the 'Yellow Pages' for programmes on environment, development, health and human rights issues, the database contains details of over 2000 productions.

The database is thematic, enabling users to search for the programmes most suitable for their needs, in the most appropriate language, format and length. For example, an NGO planning a workshop/seminar on pesticides can

request a search on all film titles covering the issue. The print-out outlines the programme's content, comments on the style of the productions, and gives information on who holds the distribution rights, for both broadcast and non-broadcast use, in different regions of the world. Print-outs are available free-of-charge to users from developing countries: for film-makers or broadcast stations in the North, there is charge of US\$30. Due to be re-launched with a new software programme in April 1995, the database will subsequently become accessible via the Geo-Net global computer network.

OUTREACH

The OUTREACH project was set up in 1986 to compile and distribute health and environment information packs for use by NGOs and in primary school curricula in developing countries. Operating through a network of national focal points, and with the approval of governments, OUTREACH assists in the development, production and free distribution of children's health and environment magazines. With a support unit funded by UNEP, the UK's Overseas Development Authority (ODA) and WWF, OUTREACH packs, summarising up-to-date scientific information in the fields of environment, development and health, are sent out on a monthly basis to over 300 individuals and organisations in over 60 countries. Packs are available in English, French, Arabic, Spanish and Portuguese versions, often linked to new programmes or series that TVE is distributing to broadcasters in the developing world. Each pack includes materials suitable for adaptation by the media, teacher training colleges and community centres.

Among the most notable successes inspired by the OUTREACH packs are 'Pied Crow', published by CARE Kenya, and distributed to every primary school and secondary school in the country; a children's health and environment magazine in Thailand, with over 100,000 copies distributed to over 13,000 institutions, including hilltribe schools and municipal reading centres; and 'Action Magazine', with 80,000 copies distributed in Zimbabwe, Botswana and Zambia.

OUTREACH information packs include radio scripts, adapted by a growing network of radio stations in the South. A quarterly newsletter, summarising OUTREACH activities and successes, was introduced in the summer of 1990.

6.2 Other Projects

Database of Southern Filmmaking Professionals

On co-productions with northern producers, TVE's policy is to push for southern crews and technicians wherever possible. With grants from NOVIB in the Netherlands and the European Commission, TVE has compiled Round the World Crews, a database of film-makers and technicians in developing countries intended to provide information to producers around the world on indigenous skills and talents.

Satellite, Cable and Back-Up

With the recent, rapid spread of new satellite and cable services, TVE has established agreements with a number of international television agencies. Cooperation with World Wide Television News (WTN), has produced Agenda 21, a popular, mainstream magazine programme focusing on sustainable development and the environment. TVE is also working closely with the BBC World Service Television which has 'footprints' over Africa, Latin America and South East Asia - enabling TVE's material to reach a wide variety of global audiences.

TVE has also built up considerable experience in producing back-up materials for programmes, and for re-editing and repackaging programmes for alternative uses, on news programmes and in the classroom. Together with WWF, UNEP, Central Television and the World Bank, TVE is a member of the IMCED consortium developing a range of interactive programmes on the environment on CD-ROM for schools and other educational institutions.

6.3 Television and Video Programme Samples

Five Realities of the Future

Damien Rea's film reveals the astonishing impact that local communities can have on their environment. In Costa Rica, the Bibri people have fought a successful battle to win back the ancestral lands taken from them by Spanish settlers. On the Japanese island of Ishigaki the villagers of Shiraho staged a campaign to stop the government building an airport which would destroy their coral reef. In India, the villagers of Dhanawas have built their own gas generators to provide cheap energy. These are among five vignettes featuring grassroots groups in five continents which demonstrate the power of local people to take control of their own lives.

Eight-year-old Adriana has a dream - to be able to fly. Confronting tomb robbers and exploring the depths of the Caribbean, Adriana is witness to man's destructive power in a fragile world. Mixing adventure and fantasy to uplifting effect, this is a tale for children and adults alike. It offers information on the threat to the global environment, and inspiration in the bid to conserve it.

Commissioned for World Environment Day 1993, this film demonstrates that economic deprivation and environmental degradation go hand in hand, creating a life of constant hardship for the people of the developing world. One of the starkest images here is of a Kenyan man felling a tree that took 70 years to grow. The money he makes from the charcoal will feed his family for just three days. But there is an imperative associated with this crisis. Development must be sustainable: the laws of economics can no longer ignore the laws of nature.

In this powerful analysis from Ireland, economist Marcus Arruda offers a different perspective on the significance of the conference. Articulating a Brazilian viewpoint, he focuses on the summit's failure to resolve the issue of debt, the power of the multinationals, the role of women, the rise of militarisation and the growing inequality between North and South. How, Arruda asks, can the rhetoric of Rio be applied to a global economic model which continues to spurn the notion of sustainability?

Audio-Visual Resources

The world is chewing up Sarawak's trees like forest 'fast food'. In the last few years, the scale of logging here has increased dramatically, generating enormous profits and thrusting Sarawak into the late twentieth century. As the booming capital Kuching becomes a 'mini Singapore', with economic growth of 10 per cent per annum, Sarawak has visions of joining the first world by 2020. But there is a price to be paid for such rapid development. With its focus on the 1991 provincial elections, Brian Leith's documentary examines the choices and dilemmas which face the people of Sarawak.

Kilum, set up by the International Council for Bird Preservation, is small scale and relies on local expertise. Korup, a more ambitious project by the World Wide Fund for Nature, began by moving people out of the forest reserve, whilst Kilum actively encouraged local people to move back in to practise sustainable use of forest resources. Winner of a Wildscreen 1992 Golden Panda Award, the film argues that conservation can only be made to work by giving local people an economic stake in the protection of their own rainforest.

The Savage Strikes Back

In Flames in the Forest, Amazon Indians resist the invasion of oil companies of traditional forests in Ecuador. Hunters and Bombers looks at the conflicting interests of the Innu of Canada and the combined air forces of the Goose Bay base. Rebels of the Forgotten World focuses on tribal armed resistance in West Papua to Indonesia's transmigration policy. The Kimberly Mob examines moves to rebuild aboriginal culture on traditional lands in Australia. And Follow the Rainbow tells the story of the Ho tribe's opposition to the construction of two massive dams on the Subarnarekhal River in South Bihar, India.

Coral Reefs

Coral reefs are one of the world's great natural miracles. They thrive in nutrient-poor water yet are one of the most productive ecosystems on earth. One reef can support over 100 different plant species, as well as a wide variety of fish which feed on the algal skin of the reef structure. Yet this precious resource is increasingly threatened by industrial contamination and ill-judged development projects. This beautiful film focuses on a pioneering research project undertaken in the Caribbean by the Smithsonian Institute. The project has contributed a great deal to our understanding of reef ecosystems and the role they may one day play in feeding the world.

The farmers of Costa Rica and Panama will only be motivated to protect the forests if it is to their financial advantage. Farming the green iguana provides the necessary incentive. Gourmets will pay large sums for its tender flesh, and the skin of the iguana is highly prized for shoes, belts and watch straps. "With 300 iguanas in one hectare of rainforest," enthuses a villager, "I can make more money than if I had the same area of cattle farm."

Parrots in Peril

Perched on the edge of the Andes, the Popocarpus National Park is one of Ecuador's most important wildlife protection areas and home to two species of parrots found nowhere else on earth. But the region has become the focus of a bitter conflict between gold miners and conservationists. The dispute has arisen over plans to extract gold from inside as well as outside the park. Parrots in Peril follows a group of young British ornithologists intent on finding the White Faced Parakeet and the Red Faced Parrot, and on confronting the Norwegian mining company which threatens to destroy their habitat.

Focusing on three reserves ranging from mangrove to savannah, this film examines the roots of the forestry crisis and assesses the needs of local communities. As KIFKON attempts to shift responsibility for forest management from national authorities to local communities, the people are at last being offered an incentive to conserve their forest.

The reefs provide the local communities with sustenance, a livelihood, and protection from the elements. Rif Blong Yumi assesses the devastating impact of population pressure, overfishing and tourism on the delicate reefs. In frank interviews with local people and government officials, the film-makers consider traditional forms of marine conservation practised by fishermen from the Marou lagoon, and examine possible solutions to the crisis.

Socotra: Island of Dragon's Blood

Edward Milner's short documentary follows the expedition, recording their efforts to catalogue and evaluate Socotra's extraordinary genetic wealth. The bark of the Dragon's Blood tree has special value. Used in ancient times by Byzantine emperors to sign their names, today it is pounded and heated to make incense, pigments and medicines. More significantly, all the botanic

specimens found here are highly resistant to drought, a genetic quality ideal for habitat restoration with enormous potential for other drought-prone parts of the world.

Whale Wars

A hard-hitting analysis of the debate between the whalers of Japan and environmental lobbyists who claim the industry is a cover-up for indefensible slaughter, Whale Wars highlights the 1993 international whaling conference held in Kyoto, Japan. Its protagonists are two officers of the Environmental Investigation Agency who reveal the truth behind the dolphin and small whale fishing industry in Japan. The Japanese government claims the whalers cater only to local consumers. But the EIA team points the finger at an operation out of control, an industry intent on expanding catches of dolphin and pilot whale, and concludes with the words of the naturalist Sir Peter Scott: "If we can't save the whale, we can't save ourselves."

Ancient Futures: Learning from Ladakh

Where tradition considers it a sin to throw rubbish into running water, crystal streams are now contaminated. This breakdown is forcing a re-examination of what we really mean by 'progress'.

Michael Chechik examines the impact of an industry which critics see as unregulated, a danger to wild fish populations and a threat to traditional fisheries. Fish Wars analyses each stage of the fish farming business and presents both sides of a conflict which goes to the heart of coastal life here. Biologists express concern over the use of hormones and antibiotics, and the threat of imported diseases from Europe. Meanwhile, industry spokesmen champion an industry which in their view represents economic salvation for the local people.

The Heat of the Moment

The oil companies may say they care about the environment in their glossy advertising campaigns, but Glen Ellis suggests otherwise. In 1989, over 80,000 litres of petroleum were leaked each week into the jungles of Ecuador, contaminating the landscape and threatening the livelihood of the indigenous peoples. Oil operations by BP in the highlands of Papua New Guinea have caused bitter land disputes while in Nigeria in 1990, 80 people lost their lives in demonstrations against Shell. In the film-makers' view, the multinationals are free to exploit the rainforest's resources but the local people are powerless to prevent the devastation which follows.

Mighty Acheloos

In central Greece, a major environmental disaster is unfolding. The Greek government is using European Community money to divert the country's largest river, the Acheloos. Thomas Schultz-Westrum follows the river from its source in the Pindus mountains to its delta and reveals worrying evidence that the proposed dams and diversions will destroy the famous Messolongi lagoons. These wetlands are supposedly protected by EC directive, yet ironically the EC is the principal sponsor of the project which threatens them. Disturbingly, the film asks whether diverting the course of the river Acheloos will lead to silting up.

Pest Wars

Yet ironically, scientists and farmers are turning away from the chemical pesticides developed as part of the 'miracle' package of the 1960s Green Revolution. Research has shown that many of these pesticides do more harm than good, poisoning the environment and killing the natural enemies of the pests. This film crosses five continents to document the development of alternative approaches, including biotechnology and the use of natural predators. In Indonesia, a 90 per cent reduction in pesticide application and the introduction of natural predators achieved an impressive 50 per cent rise in rice production within three years.

How can community programmes be used to introduce traditional and innovative techniques to halt the process of land degradation and to restore the fertile plains, the wadis, of Yemen?

IUCN - The World Conservation Union

Founded in 1948, The World Conservation Union brings together States, government agencies and a diverse range of non-governmental organizations in a unique world partnership: over 800 members in all, spread across some 130 countries.

As a Union, IUCN seeks to influence, encourage and assist societies throughout the world to conserve the integrity and diversity of nature and to ensure that any use of natural resources is equitable and ecologically sustainable. A central secretariat coordinates the IUCN Programme and serves the Union membership, representing their views on the world stage and providing them with the strategies, services, scientific knowledge and technical support they need to achieve their goals. Through its six Commissions, IUCN draws together over 6000 expert volunteers in project teams and action groups, focusing in particular on species and biodiversity conservation and the management of habitats and natural resources. The Union has helped many countries to prepare National Conservation Strategies, and demonstrates the application of its knowledge through the field projects it supervises. Operations are increasingly decentralized and are carried forward by an expanding network of regional and country offices, located principally in developing countries.

The World Conservation Union builds on the strengths of its members, networks and partners to enhance their capacity and to support global alliances to safeguard natural resources at local, regional and global levels.

UNEP

The Stockholm Conference on the Human Environment, convened by the United Nations in 1972 to consider the condition of the environment, called for the elevation of environmental awareness and the promotion of such actions at all levels of society worldwide.

The UNEP mission statement explains what the organization does and why: "UNEP is to provide leadership in caring for the environment by promoting, inspiring, informing, enabling and assisting nations and peoples to improve their quality of life without compromising that of future generations."

UNEP has been at the forefront of conservation efforts and sustainable use of the earth's resources and has assisted in the development of the 1992 Convention on Biological Diversity. In 1994 during the first Conference of the Parties, UNEP was chosen to continue in the capacity of the permanent secretariat for the Convention.

UNEP also continues to administer the 1973 Convention International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) and the 1979 Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species and Wild Animals (CMS).

The UNEP Biodiversity Programme and Implementation Strategy (BPIS), launched in November 1994, provides the overall framework for the organization's activities in the field of biodiversity. It is fundamentally a multidisciplinary, multi-sectoral approach to the integrated management and sustainable utilization of biodiversity in oceans and coastal areas, freshwater ecosystems and terrestrial ecosystems.
