Global Partnership on Marine Litter (GPML)

- Launched in Rio+20, June 2012 to protect human health and the environment by the reduction and management of ML
- Stand alone resolutions on marine plastic litter and microplastics adopted at all United Nations Environmental Assemblies (UNEA 1/6 and UNEA 2/11, and UNEA 3/7)
- Voluntary multi-stakeholder partnership ~ 120+ partners, many networks in their own right (African Marine Waste Network, Clean Europe Network etc.)
- Help countries reach their targets related to Sustainable Development Goal target 14 1





GPML: Four Regional nodes

- Wider Caribbean: Gulf and Caribbean Fisheries Institute (GCFI)
- Northwest Pacific: Northwest Pacific Action Plan (NOWPAP)
- Pacific: Secretariat of the Pacific Regional Environment Programme (SPREP)
- Mediterranean: under development by UNEP/MAP/Barcelona Convention



GPML: Current and Future Activities

- Strengthening the GPML is ongoing (support from Norway)
 - Expanding the membership (incl. #CleanSeas members) and Steering Group outreach
 - Expanding the regional nodes
 - The online marine litter network (MLN): http://marinelitternetwork.com/ (since June 2017)
- Expanding other activities
 - Providing a secretariat for the International Coalition "Stop Plastic Waste" (spearheaded by France, Monaco, Morocco etc.)
 - TOR for the G20 Global Network of the Committed to implement the G20 Action plan (after July 2018)
 - Harmonization of ML and Microplastics Monitoring Methodologies and SDG 14.1 (GESAMP in 2)15

#Clean Seas: Goals


- To promote upstream actions tackling plastic pollution, such as:
- Improving plastics management
- Phasing out non-recoverable plastics (e.g. microplastics in cosmetics)
- Significantly reducing single-use plastics
- Recycling all plastics consumed and avoiding waste






#Clean Seas: 43 Countries Joined as of May 2018







#Clean Seas: 2017-2022






Ocean Expeditions / Races





- The Volvo Ocean Race started from Alicante, Spain on 22 October and will finish in The Hague, Netherlands in June 2018
- Covers 11 legs over 45,000 nautical miles and takes in 12 major cities on six continents.

6th International Marine Debris Conference (6IMDC)

- Jointly organized by US NOAA and UN Environment
- To share lessons learned and best practices to reduce and prevent marine debris and its impacts; exchange innovative ideas; and share research initiatives, methods, and results
- 75 technical sessions across ten track areas
- More than 700 participants







Implementing UNEA 3/7 Resolution on Marine Litter and Microplastics

Main common categories of activities of UNEA-3 resolutions

Science, data, access to information, reporting, SDGs Standards, regulations and integrated policy development

Industry, private sector engagement, (incl. circular economy/lifecycle) and NGO engagement

Methodologies and tools development, Capacity-building, strengthening of technical and institutional capacity

Education, training

Communication



Regional cooperation, partnership building with all, incl. UN Agencies

Towards Implementation of UNEA3/7 Resolution



Operative Paragraph 7

- Expansion of the Global Partnership on Marine Litter
- Development of six new Regional Action Plans
- Harmonization of monitoring methodologies for marine litter

Operative Paragraph 10

Ad-Hoc Open-Ended Experts Group (May & November):

- Explore all barriers to combating marine litter and microplastics, including challenges related to resources in developing countries;
- ✓ Identify the range of national, regional and international response options, including actions and innovative approaches, and voluntary and legally binding governance strategies and approaches;
- ✓ Identify environmental, social and economic costs and benefits of different response options;
- ✓ Examine the feasibility and effectiveness of different response options;
- ✓ Identify potential options for continued work

Operative Paragraph 11

Progress report on implementation of marine litter resolutions through e.g. an online reporting mechanism



Future Directions for ML Action Plans

- Stocktaking and preparation of guidance document on regional action plans (completed in 2018)
- ⇒ Informal community for regional seas
- Rapid assessments for the identification of hotspots for priority intervention
- ⇒ Regional assessments
- Development of national and regional projects to address regional and national priorities
- ⇒ **Implement** action plans
- Emerging issues (e.g., microplastics)
- ⇒ **Revision** of existing action plans
